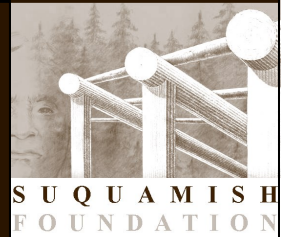


2012-2013 ANNUAL REPORT



MILESTONES

The Suquamish Foundation celebrated the opening of the new Suquamish Museum on Saturday, September 15, 2012. The museum is the last of the Suquamish Foundation Cultural Resurgence Capital Campaign projects. The \$7.5 million 9,000 square foot state-of-the-art facility design follows the traditional aesthetic architecture of Coast Salish peoples.

The use of Cedar log construction and siding at the west end of the building beautifully links us to the forest environment. Every room is warm and rich in texture and color inviting visitors to relax, learn, and spend some time getting to know the Suquamish people.



The Suquamish Museum Board of Trustees and curatorial staff worked with Storyline Studios to design the permanent exhibit. “*Ancient Shores – Changing Tides*” presents the story of the Suquamish People in a traditional way. The installation of the exhibit inspires visitors to see, listen and learn in a different way; to displace the modern way of historical contextual understanding. Culture is more than historical events strung together. The passing of knowledge and values, generation to generation, is the core of Suquamish culture.

The Tribe and Foundation have successfully completed the “Building for Cultural Resurgence” capital campaign to create a network of culturally significant resources on the Port Madison Indian Reservation, including the Suquamish Museum, Community House, Early Learning Center, renovations to Chief Seattle’s Gravesite and community dock.
